Another date to keep in mind is Sunday, March 20, 2022 at 2:00 pm when we will have our Annual Meeting. The location is yet to be determined.



Tom Lowe's 43rd Street Returns to the Stage!

If you lived in the Greater Lake Sunapee Region during the '70s and '80s you no doubt remember seeing or hearing about the musical comedies presented by the Sutton Homesteaders. These 14 productions were written and directed by the late Tom Lowe from 1971-1984 and were staged at the Kearsarge Regional High School in North Sutton. The productions raised thousands of dollars for the South Sutton Meetinghouse and the New London Hospital as well as for the support of a scholarship fund awarded to graduates from KRHS pursuing the performing arts. The scholarship was named in Lowe's honor and is managed by the NH Charitable Foundation.

43rd Street is the last production written by Lowe as he passed from a battle with cancer in 1985 at the age of 64. Each of his plays had a professional flair benefiting from the vaudeville background of Tom and his brother Don as well as other seasoned performers such as Lucille Page-West, Babe Sargent and several closet hams in the area. Tom had many talents. He wrote the script, the music (though he didn't know how to read music), designed the sets and the costumes, and directed and performed in each production. Susie Lowe-Stockwell, oldest daughter of Don, will direct this production in which she and her sisters Kathy and Kim all performed in the past. (*Continued*, *p*. 3)

TURNING TOWARD THE SUN will have its premier opening in Warner, New Hampshire in November by SKIT performers. Both this stage adaptation and book of the same title were written by Ceil Warren, a New York author. She shares a love story wrapped in comedy about a wonderful New England town, just like the ones we live in. Center for the Arts will be partnering with SKIT to bring this lovely story to you.
